The minutes of the October 17th meeting were unanimously approved as distributed.

Ryan Williams gave the Financial Report. We ended FY 2019 up with \$33,508.55 in the bank. Many expected expenses were not incurred. A continuation of the budget as-is until the next meeting was requested and approved.

2019 Holiday Home Tour Review: 428 tickets sold, \$8,480 in ticket sales, and \$2,615.10 in expenses. For the 2020 Tour, it was suggested that: ticket prices remain the same for a few more years; if ticket prices are increased, we could offer single and couple prices; family rates; and student rates.

Ad Hoc Committee Reports

Beautification Committee – Holle Humphries

The Association has \$2,000 earmarked for trees at Tech Terrace Park, but Holle has tried in vain to get a response from Parks & Rec. There are also four dead trees in Wagner Park. Now that Councilman Griffith has gotten involved, hopefully those trees can be planted and replaced this spring. Tai brought up that Apache Corp. has a tree-granting program. He and Grant are going to look into it.

The tennis courts in Wagner Park need resurfacing. We were told that we are on a long waiting list but are willing to cover part or all the costs if it means the work needed can be completed sooner. Additionally, the volleyball court has settled and sunk and the net lining needs replacing. We would like to meet with City Council to discuss the needs of our parks and how best go about getting things done.

Parks & Rec recently replaced the lights at Wagner Park and the playground. The irrigation bubbler still needs to be replaced for the garden spot at Tech Terrace Park. The bench at the Marjorie Manning commemorative area also needs to be replaced. Parks & Rec also resurfaced the jogging trails a few weeks ago.

The subject of beautification of 26th and Boston was revisited. In previous meetings creating a “downtown” Tech Terrace at the intersection with artwork to create a plaza. The discussion continued with placing obelisks at the intersection or possibly closing off 26th between Canton and Boston. It was agreed that we should open this up for further discussion.

Gary Mims brought up the subject of Historic designation for Tech Terrace. He will investigate this.

The lack of police patrolling the parks was discussed as several members agreed that there have been less of a police presence in Tech Terrace.
